GENERAL PROGRAM UPDATE.

There have been no major changes to the Art History program mission or purpose, however in response to declining enrollments and to further strengthen our program and support our students, in 2016-17, Art History, along with the Fine Arts program, continued to focus on outreach, community involvement, and increased efficiency, encouraging our students to complete one or more of our degrees. In addition, we are increasing efforts to create a sense of engagement and community among our student body, both within and outside the classroom. In Fall 2016, we taught our first concurrent enrollment class at New Tech High in Nipomo where we are in a two-year rotation for Art Appreciation. Concurrent enrollment offers a new direction for our program. We will pursue other opportunities as they arise.

The gallery continues to be a significant outreach and community involvement tool and is essential for the teaching of the Art Gallery class. Please see the Art Studio APPW for a list of gallery and division exhibitions and outreach events that occurred in 2016-17.

At the end of Spring 2016 our full-time, tenure track art history instructor, Megin Debin, resigned to take a job at Fullerton College. We quickly started the process for a one-year, full-time replacement and were extremely fortunate to find Michelle Craig. Michelle is qualified to teach DE Art Appreciation, all of the art history courses and our Museum Practices and Art Gallery courses. Michelle continued the Art History club and Facebook page, has evaluated part-time instructors and has been an insightful participant in division meetings. She joined the Academic Senate in Spring 2017.

Although we anticipate no changes to the mission or purpose of our program, we look forward to stability and leadership for the overall direction of our program with the hiring of a tenure-track faculty for next year.




DATA ANALYSIS AND PROGRAM-SPECIFIC MEASUREMENTS


Enrollment Art History:






Enrollments have ranged between 250 and 280 for the last five years. We have been and will strive to keep our enrollments steady by drafting schedules with time slots that fill well. Disaggregated data specifically for Art History is not available as Art History is within the Fine Arts division and all classes have the ART prefix. Enrollment Art Appreciation:






Enrollment for Art 200 has seen greater ranges than art history classes. Enrollment in Art 200 rose by 99 students in 2014-15 and dropped 79 students in 2015-16. Our gains and losses were contrary to overall college enrollments and do not correlate to the number of sectioned offered: 2014-15 had 14 sections and the other years had 15 sections. One factor was the replacement of face-to-face courses with caps of 40 with DE courses that had caps of 30. In 2015-16, we went from offering two DE courses a year to five. We would have gained an additional 50 enrollments if DE caps had been set at 40 in the 2015-16 academic year.


General Student Demand (Fill Rate) (Insert Aggregated Data Chart)

Fill Rate Art History:




Fill rates have steadily declined in the past five years. Although the trend mirrors the decline in overall college fill rates, 2014-16 saw significantly lower fill rates. We think the popularity of DE Art Appreciation courses for students fulfilling a general education requirement may be drawing students from face-to-face courses. Another factor may be the time lag between courses being approved and their inclusion in our AD-T. In 2015, based on the transfer model curriculum, we divided our one non-Western course (Art 206- now deactivated) into four new courses: Art 207: Mexican Art I (Precolumbian), Art 208: Mexican Art II (Colonial to Contemporary), Art 209: Asian Art, and Art 210: Art of Africa, Native America, and Oceania. Students may not have enrolled in Art 207, which was very low enrolled when offered in Spring 2016, because these changes were not reflected in the catalogue for either of our AD-Ts (Art History and Studio Art) due to the slow State approval process. That same lag has possibly affected Art 207 and Art 208, which were offered this year. Although low enrolled, the courses were not cut because these courses are geared specifically at better serving our local San Luis Obispo county population, which has an increasing number of Latino students who may be attracted to our campus because of these new course offerings and may help address the mandate to help increase student success, particularly of underperforming student populations such as young, male Latino/Hispanic students. The revised AA-T Art History was finally approved at the Chancellor's Office in February 2017. This revision was to remove the deactivated course ART 206 and add the new art history courses of ART 207, ART 208, ART 209, and ART 210. The approval was received in time for the 2017-2018 catalog.

Fill Rate Western Art History:



The chart above shows data for our three western art history courses (Art 203, 204 and 205). Fill rates are the same as the overall college. With inclusion in the AD-Ts and outreach we hope our non-western series of courses will have healthy fill rates. Offering fewer face-to-face art history courses and exploring DE art history are strategies being considered to improve fill rates for all art history courses.


Fill Rate Art Appreciation:



In an attempt to capture more students and increase efficiency we began offering Art 200 in the humanities forum. The first year the course filled well and the second it did not, which in combination with low enrolled North County classes affected our fill rates.



Efficiency Art History:




Efficiency for AHPP courses are at or above overall college efficiency. The same problems that effected fill rate are reflected here.

Efficiency Art Appreciation:




Efficiency for Art 200 is higher than the overall college, but much below where is should be to offset our classes with lower caps, such at Art 202 and 295. An increase in the cap from 30-40 for DE Art Appreciation will help bring up these numbers.

The target for Fines Arts is to increase FTES by 1% and decrease FTEF by 2.8%. The Art History program will help meet these targets with the increased caps in DE Art Appreciation and by putting Art 295: Art Gallery on a two-year cycle. In Fall 2017, Art 200 will be offered at 8:00 am on the North County campus as part of the two-year rotation for the Business Admin and Ag Business AD-Ts, which ideally will help fill that class.

Course Completion Art History:




Course completion is above the overall college with an almost 3% increase in 2015-16. Completion rates for Art 200 were almost identical.

Student Success Art History:





With the exception of a dip in 2011-12 and a spike in 2012-13 for DE, completion rates for DE and face-to-face have been similar, steady and slightly above the college figures. We are not able to break out individual courses in DE so the results for DE Art 200 are mixed with two DE Graphics courses (255 and 256).

Art History instructors are encouraged to reach out to students who are struggling or have missed more than one class session. Students are asked to seek additional help in office hours and are made aware of services offered by the college.

Degrees and Certificates Awarded (Insert Data Chart)



From 2015 to 2016 we saw an increase in the number of students awarded AD-T and a decrease in the number of students awarded the AA AHPP. This year we know we have several students enrolled in the Art Gallery class who are close to completing both the AD-T and AA AHPP. We currently have fifteen students self-identified as AD-T and/or AA AHPP majors.

Next fall, which will be our third fall semester offering Art 200 in the humanities forum, we will assess whether fill rates warrant continuing the practice.

We will work with the scheduler to find time slots that keep our North County classes in Dallin's hall or the science forum, which appear to be the only classrooms with adequate AV for our image dependent courses.

Next fall, the tenure-track instructor will assess our two-year rotation of courses based on frequency needed for students to complete our degrees and fill rates.

We will welcome opportunities for concurrent and dual enrollment.
