GENERAL PROGRAM UPDATE

The Drama Program's Theatre Productions continue to be the heart of our program. The productions continue to introduce and involve our students with guest artists. It serves as a powerful bridge to the community and acts as an outreach tool. Diversity of artists and literature are central to our mission. As the pandemic swept across the country and theatres boarded up, faculty retooled the platform of performance and took on a new virtual challenge. Plays were replaced by podcast episodes and students gained valuable performance skills on the new platforms. We continue to stimulate cross disciplinary conversations throughout our county, region, nation and now globally to ensure student engagement and challenge. A new course *Theatrical Costume Construction II* has been written and is awaiting approval.

This will allow our students to receive expert technical theatre training and be competitiveness when transferring to 4 year theatre programs.










SLOCCCD Program Review Data - Student Demand (Fill Rate)


We are relieved to see our fill rate buoy from a low of 65% in 2018 – 19.



Student success for online courses is at its highest in the past 5 years. New strategies have successfully been implemented to boost students feeling of connectivity to the department and to the student community in both modalities.



Cuesta College's Theatre Program is recognized as the best Theatre Program at a Community College in the USA by the Kennedy Centre American College Theatre Festival for the 8th consecutive year.

The global pandemic has crushed the theatre program, DRA 200 cannot be effectively offered on a virtual platform. DRA 200 represents the gateway into the program. All technical theatre classes were cancelled in Fall 2020 due to the closure of the CPAC facility and sheltering in place mandates. In spring 2021 only one course offering in technical theatre was offered, DRA 236. We expect a rebound in course offerings and enrollment post pandemic.

We hope to offer a DRA 237 in Spring 2022 and "crosslist" it with DRA 236 to improve the fill rate of those courses.

We continue to be concerned about enrollment and are working on new ways to bring more students into the program to maintain 'critical mass' in the smaller classes and to achieve higher levels of efficiency.

A. Until the spring of 2020 we toured local schools offering workshops to theatre students as a recruiting effort. Our national reputation has attracted students from outside of our county into the program.

B. We are adding a new course, DRA 237, aimed at diversifying our offerings, building efficiency and retaining student engagement.

The Pandemic has clarified what classes transfer well to a virtual platform and the courses that require a face to face structure. We will be implementing these new findings.

D. We will be moving some of our costume stores to a "dry cleaner" rack in the old "Interact Theatre" (Shipping and Receiving), Prop storage will be provided by a 20' shipping container. We are in the process of re-organizing the prop area in anticipation of the arrival of a 40' shipping container. Sadly, the shipping container arrived smelling of oil and is not usable for costumes. We will be using it for property storage. All home hobby sewing machines in the costume construction studio have been replaced by industrial use machines to replicate industry standards.
