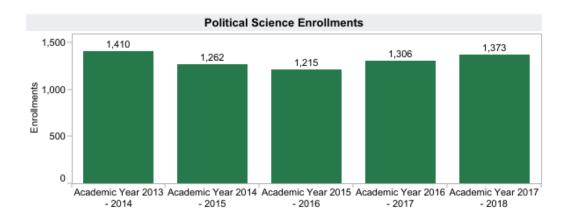

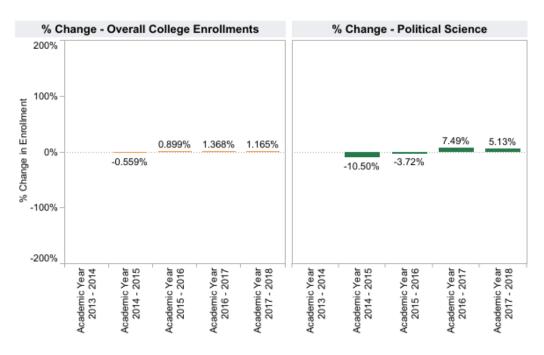

Overall, general enrollment has a positive trend. While generally following the same trend as the college (significant drop in 2014-2015 with gradual improvement in the subsequent years), the growth in Political Science has significantly exceeded that of the college in the previous two years. This speaks to the strength of the program as a whole, the excellence of the instruction, desirable course offerings, and flexibility of class scheduling (multiple sites, night offerings, late start offerings, and DE).

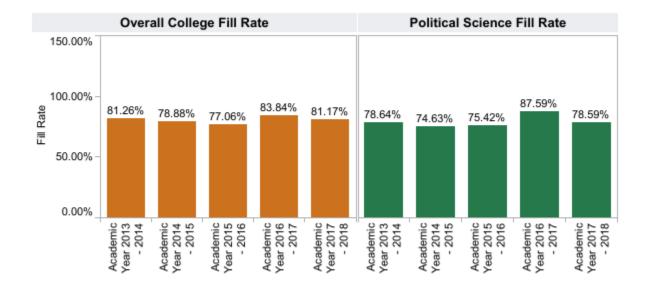

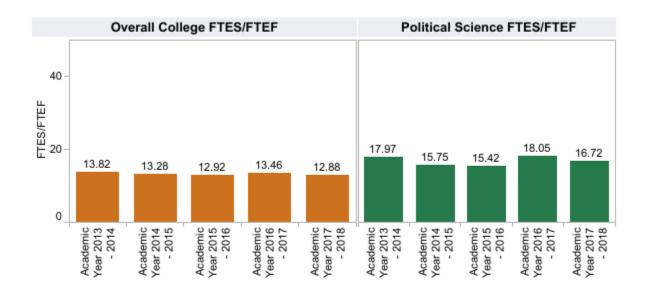

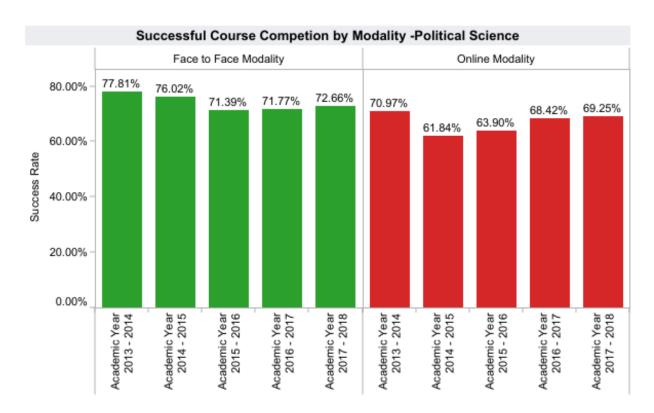

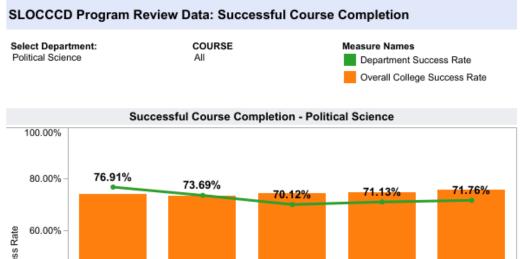

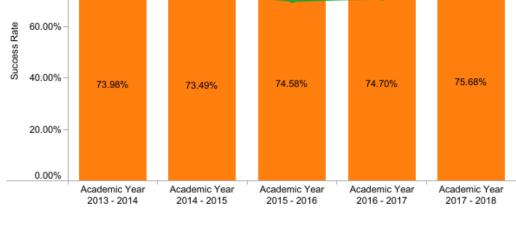
Program Awards: The number of degress and certificates awarded by program type

The original AA degree has declined as the AA-T has grown and become the de facto degree for the program. For Political Science as a field of study and for those seeking employment, a four year degree would be the norm. At one point the AA would have been seen as the stepping stone for transfering to a four year program. For obvious reasons, the AA-T has, therefore, supplanted the AA as the most desirable degree in the field offered at Cuesta. The growth seen in the previous few years is likely the result of more students learning about the new AA-T and the increased desirability of that degree for

students in the program seeking to transfer to a four year program.

Overall, the Political Science Program is lower than the overall college's average. One explanation is the higher course caps in both face to face and online modality. That is due to the high standards and more complex subject matter that our students are exposed to. There was a drop from the 2014-2015 to 2015-2016 and this may be explained by the opening up of DE courses that have a higher non-successful rate.

For the disaggregated data, there was very little that could be gleaned from the information. In some categories differences were not particularly distinct or noteworthy. For those where differences were more visible, they were largely items that are known challenges in education as a whole (students from low income backgrounds, second language learners, etc.) Furthermore, these challenges reflect broader issues is society and are largely outside of our control. We are aware of the challenges faced by the diversity of our student population and will continue to attempt to meet their needs to the best of our ability by using a variety of teaching methods, approaches, best practices, assessment tools, etc.
