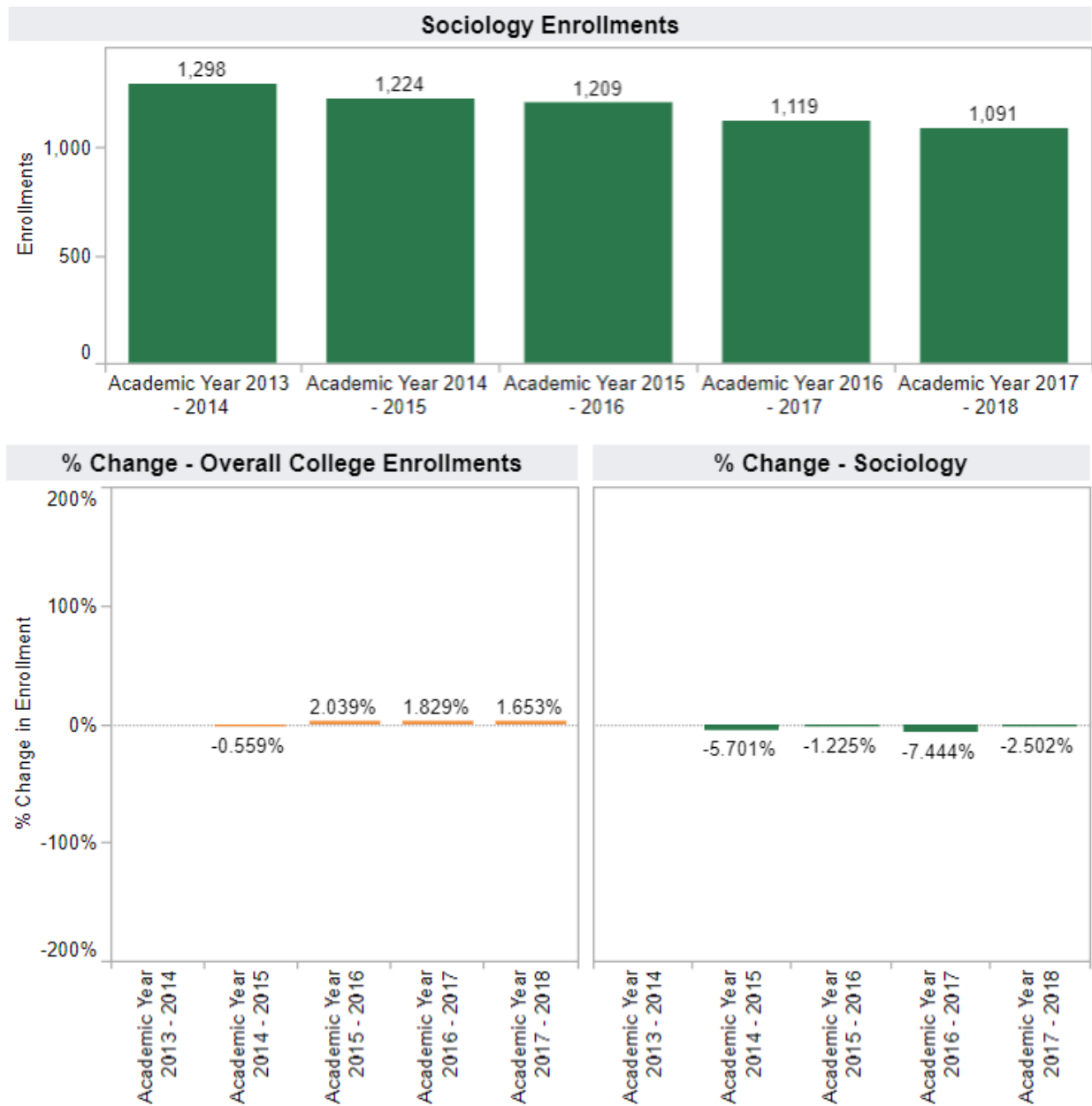

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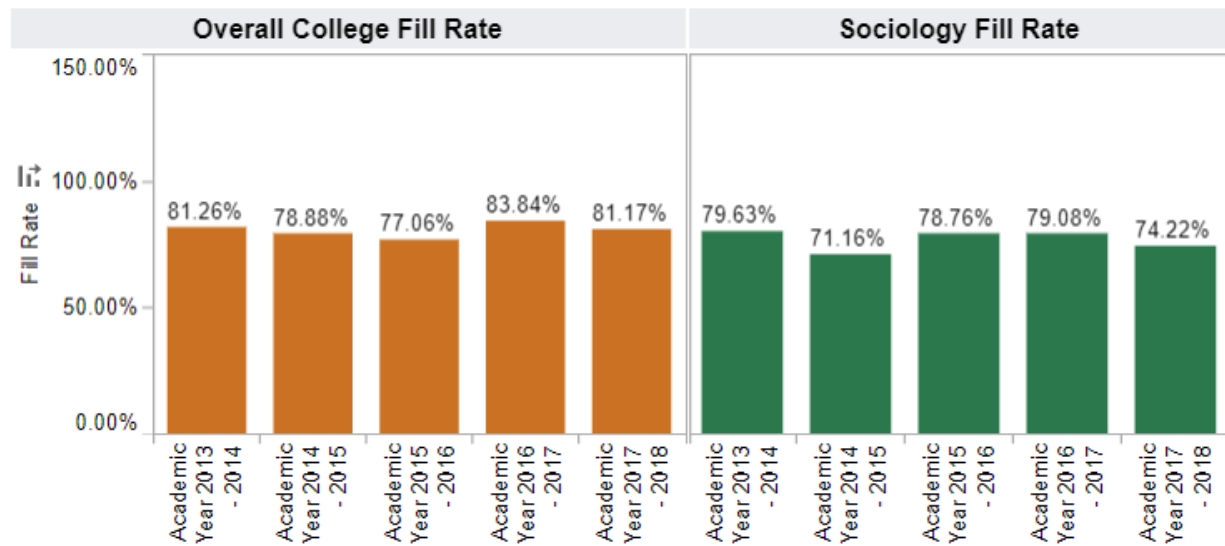
### General Enrollment (Insert Aggregated Data Chart)



- 1091 students were enrolled in Sociology courses in 2017-2018, a drop from 1119 in 2016-2017.
- The enrollment trend over the past five years is downward.
- The enrollment drop over the past three years possibly reflects the reduction of classes to increase efficiency.
- Offering courses on the North County, South County, SLO campus and online as well as at varied times is a strategy used to increase enrollment.

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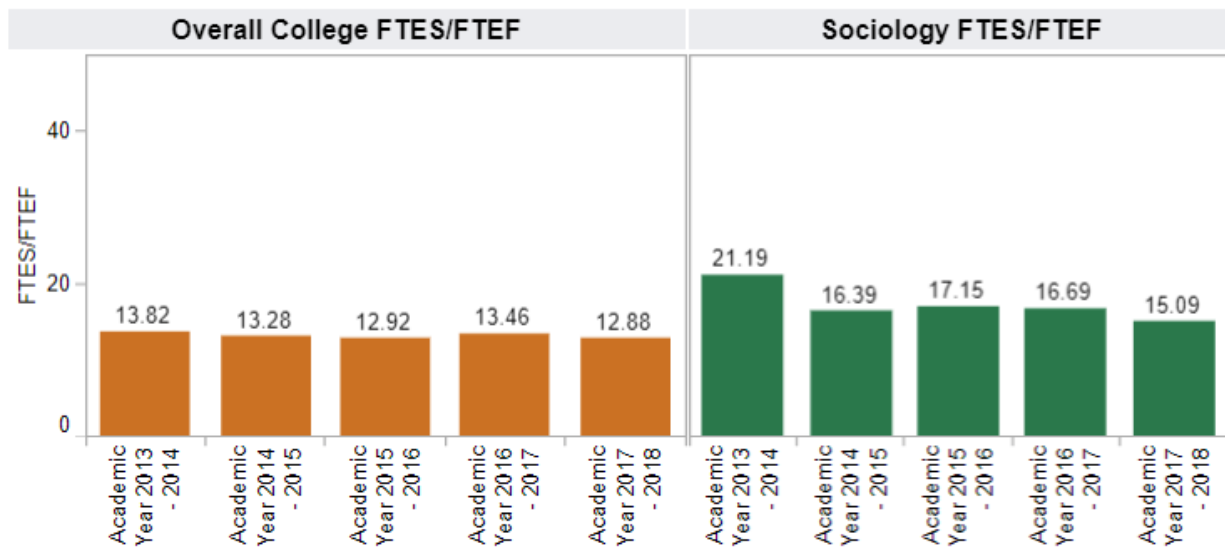
### General Student Demand (Fill Rate) (Insert Aggregated Data Chart)



- Fill rates in Sociology remained fairly steady over the past five years, generally following the overall college trend.
- The slight drop in fill rate in 2017-2018 may reflect adding courses in the North County where fill rates tend to be lower.
- There is no plan to change the course schedule significantly. However, we are teaching a greater variety of courses in the North County and have taught a few courses at the California Men's Colony.

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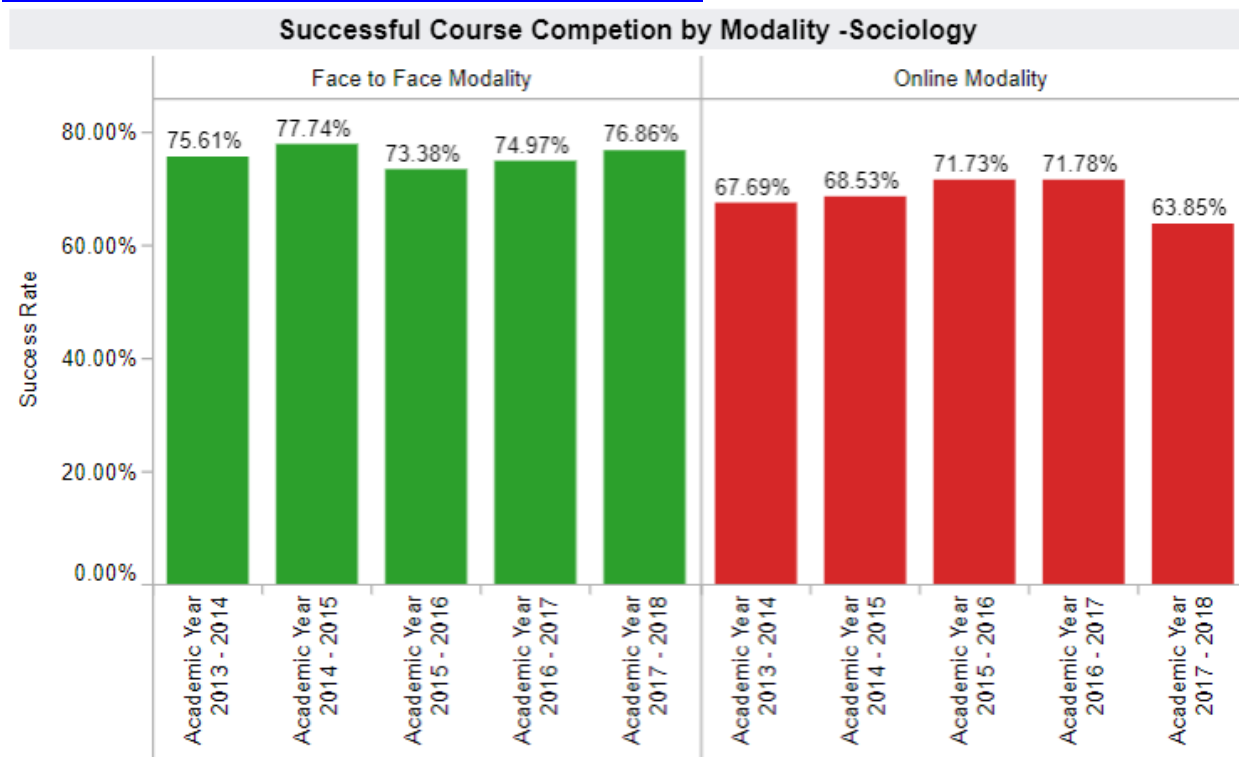
### General Efficiency (FTES/FTEF) (Insert Aggregated Data Chart)



- Sociology's FTES/FTEF has been consistently higher than the college average.
- Sociology's FTES/FTEF for 2017-2018 was 15.09. In 2016-2017, FTES/FTEF was 16.69.
- FTES/FTEF has held fairly steady over the last four years reflecting the overall college trend.
- The declining efficiency over the last five years possibly reflects declining student enrollment

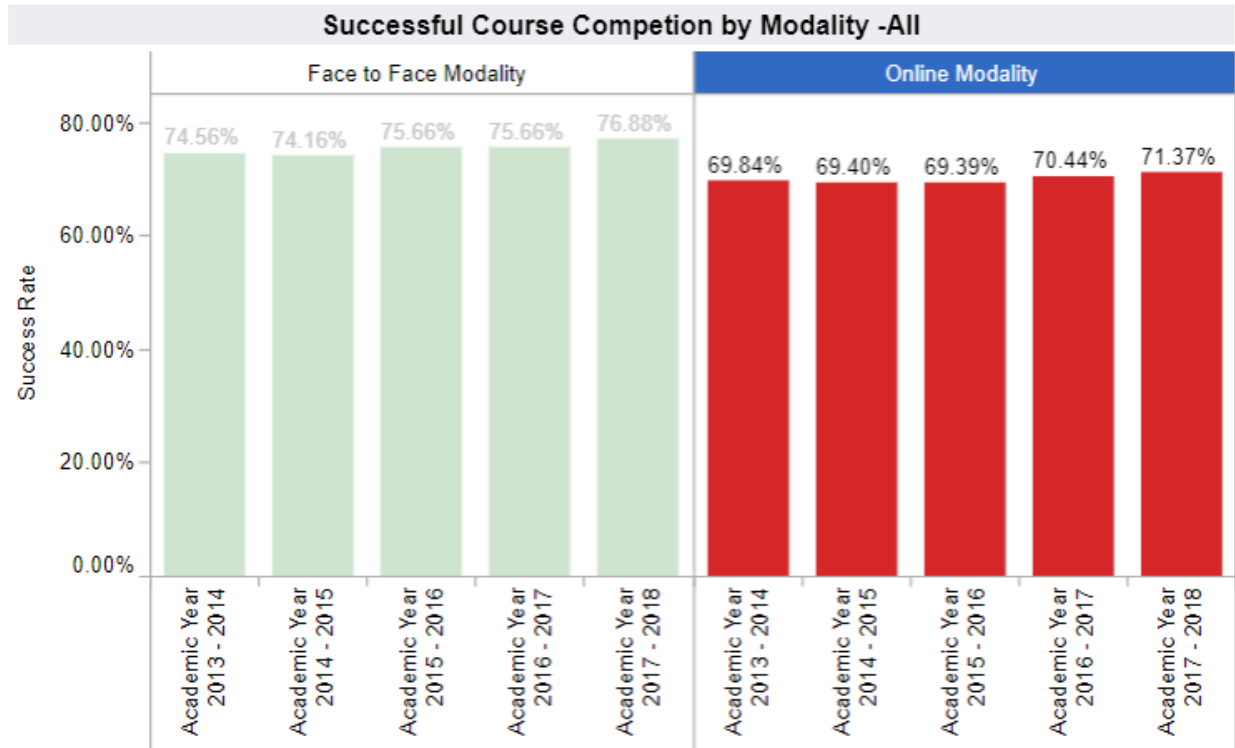

- With respect to differences by modality, the success rates for face-to-face courses were higher.
- The overall college success rate for the face-to-face modality in academic year 2017-2018 was 76.88%. The Sociology success rate for the face-to-face modality in academic year 2017-2018 was the same at 76.86%.
- The overall college success rate for the online modality in academic year 2017-2018 was 71.37%. The Sociology success rate for the online modality in academic year 2017-2018 was 63.85%.

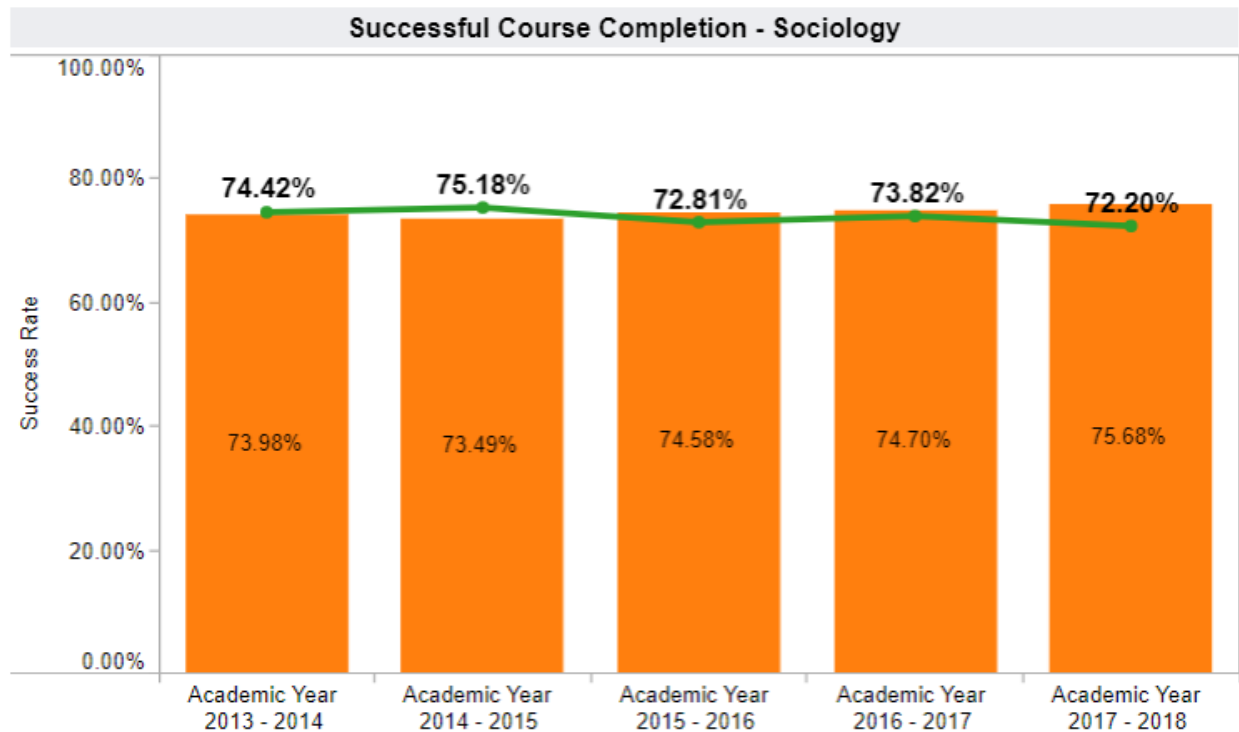

- In 2017-2018, 26 Sociology AATs were awarded and 4 Sociology AAs for a total of 32.
- The five-year trend is upward, going from 17 in 2013-2014 to 32 in 2017-2018 (combined AAT and AA).
- The mostly likely factor that explains the increase is the availability of the AAT and students finding out about the benefits of receiving one before transferring to a four-year school.

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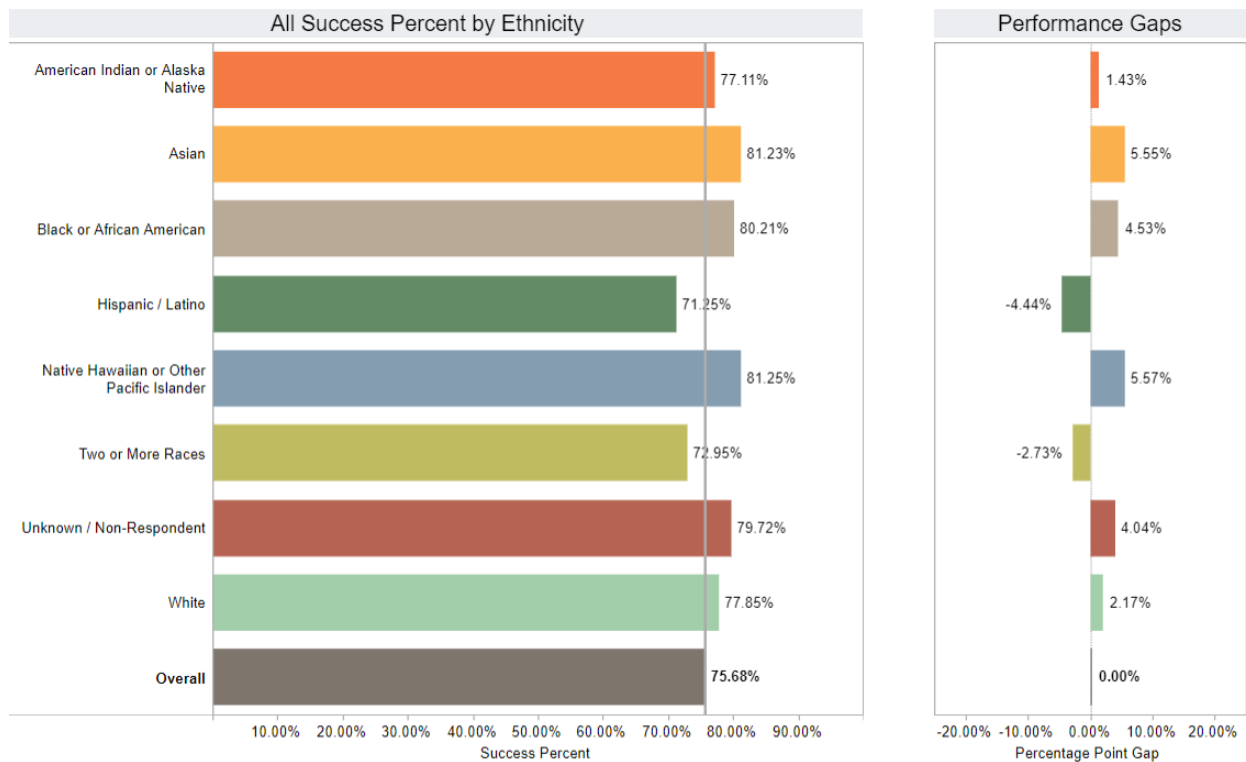
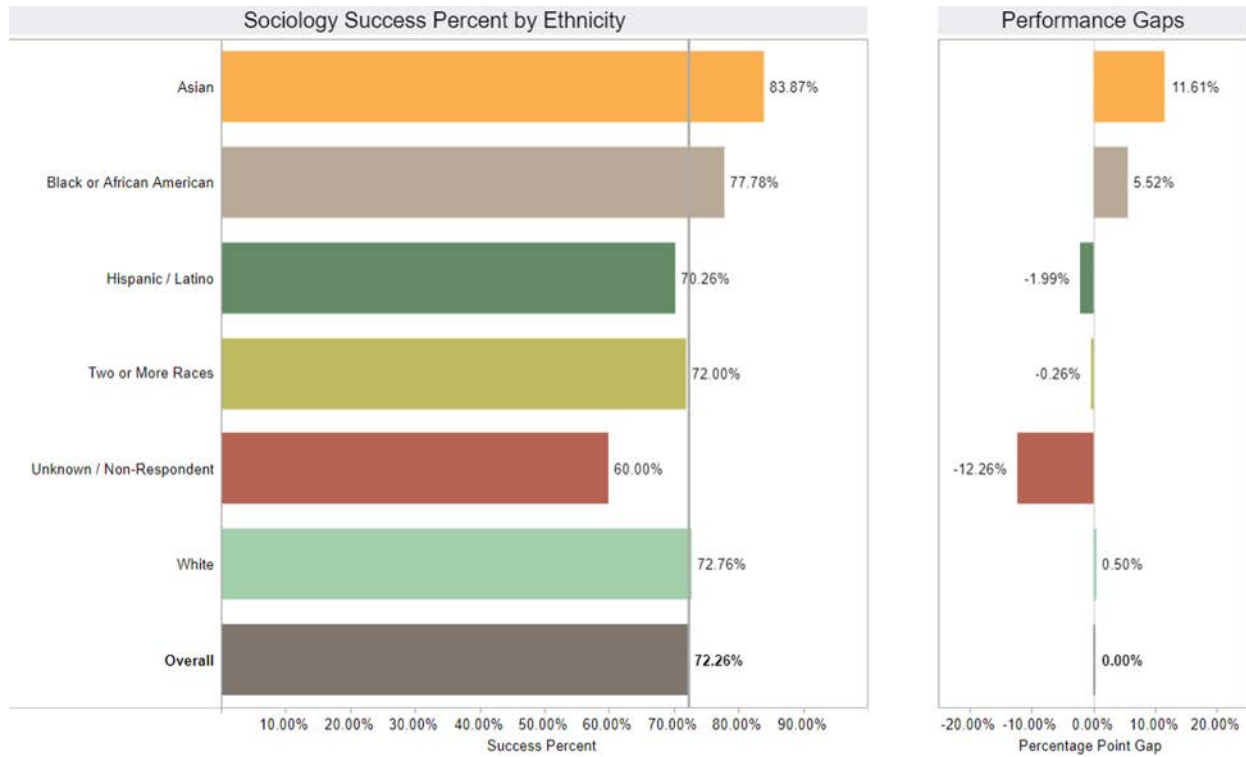

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- The success rates from 2013-2014 to 2017-2018 in Sociology classes are very similar to the overall college success rates, with a slight drop in 2017-2018.
- Examining the 2017-2018 data, whites have a slightly higher than average rate of success (0.50% higher than average). Hispanics have a somewhat lower rate of success (1.99% lower than average). This success gap difference is very similar to the overall college success gap between whites (2.17% higher than average) and Hispanics (4.44% lower than average).
- The causes of the success gap between whites and Hispanics in Sociology are probably similar to the causes of the success gap between whites and Hispanics in the college overall, which are probably similar to the causes of racial and ethnic success gaps found in American education generally and much discussed in the literature. Modeling effective programs might be a way to address the racial and ethnic success gap.
- With respect to current strategies, we are using the Annual Program Planning process which includes measuring SLOs and considering efforts to increase learning outcomes as discussed in the course CPAS forms that are attached. The data presented here suggests that efforts to maintain high levels of student success is effective. Sociology's success rates have been close to the overall college success rates over the last five years.
