## Who Should Take an Online Course?

### **THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT**

This course is designed for students who have computer literacy and are self-motivated. In addition, this class is not self-paced. You will have set due dates for readings, discussions, and assignments. In addition, much of your learning will happen through reading. You will be reading the lectures online and reading the material in your texts.

An anecdote: Recently, I was working with a student in the Writing Center who was planning to enroll in English 201A. I asked him if he was going to take the class on campus or online. He said, “I’m going to take the real class—the one in the classroom.” I used this situation as a teachable moment, which I’ll pass on to you. A distance education class is a REAL class—just as rigorous and just as informative. In fact, sometimes the online mode is even less flexible than a traditional classroom. For example, when you have an assignment due on a particular date and time, Canvas will not accept the assignment past that time whereas in a traditional class you might have a bit more flexibility.

The best advice I can give you is this: DON’T FALL BEHIND! It will be very difficult to catch up.

## Computer Requirements

# **What are the basic computer specifications for Canvas?**

This is a list of basic computer system requirements to use Canvas. It is always recommended to use the most up-to-date versions and better connections. Canvas will still run with the minimum specifications, but you may experience slower loading times.

Canvas and its hosting infrastructure are designed for maximum compatibility and minimal requirements.

## Screen Size

Canvas is best viewed at a minimum of 800x600, which is the average size of a notebook computer. If you want to view Canvas on a device with a smaller screen, we recommend using the Canvas mobile app.

## Operating Systems

- Windows 7 and newer (users on Windows 10 need to download the [Windows 10 Anniversary Update](#) to submit Canvas assignments)
- Mac OSX 10.6 and newer
- Linux - chromeOS

## Mobile Operating System Native App Support

- iOS 7 and newer (versions vary by device)
- Android 4.2 and newer

## Computer Speed and Processor

- Use a computer 5 years old or newer when possible
- 1GB of RAM
- 2GHz processor

## Internet Speed

- Along with compatibility and web standards, Canvas has been carefully crafted to accommodate low bandwidth environments.
- Minimum of 512kbps

- PC: [JAWS](#) (latest version for Internet Explorer)
- PC: [NVDA](#) (latest version for Firefox)
- There is no screen reader support for Canvas in Chrome

**THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT**

For success in this course, you must have access to a reliable computer, an email account, and a functioning Internet connection. You should also have a backup plan should your system or your Internet provider fail you. Since you will email your assignments via Canvas's internal system, you

must at least have a basic understanding of how to use email, navigate the Internet, and communicate online.

You must also have

- Access to Microsoft Word so that papers can be submitted in proper MLA format. You can purchase it at a very reasonable price at the Cuesta bookstore or online. I do not accept google docs.
- Ability to save files in Microsoft Word (.doc).

Adobe Acrobat Reader plug-in. This is a free plug-in that will enable you to read any of the readings or handouts that are in PDF format.
