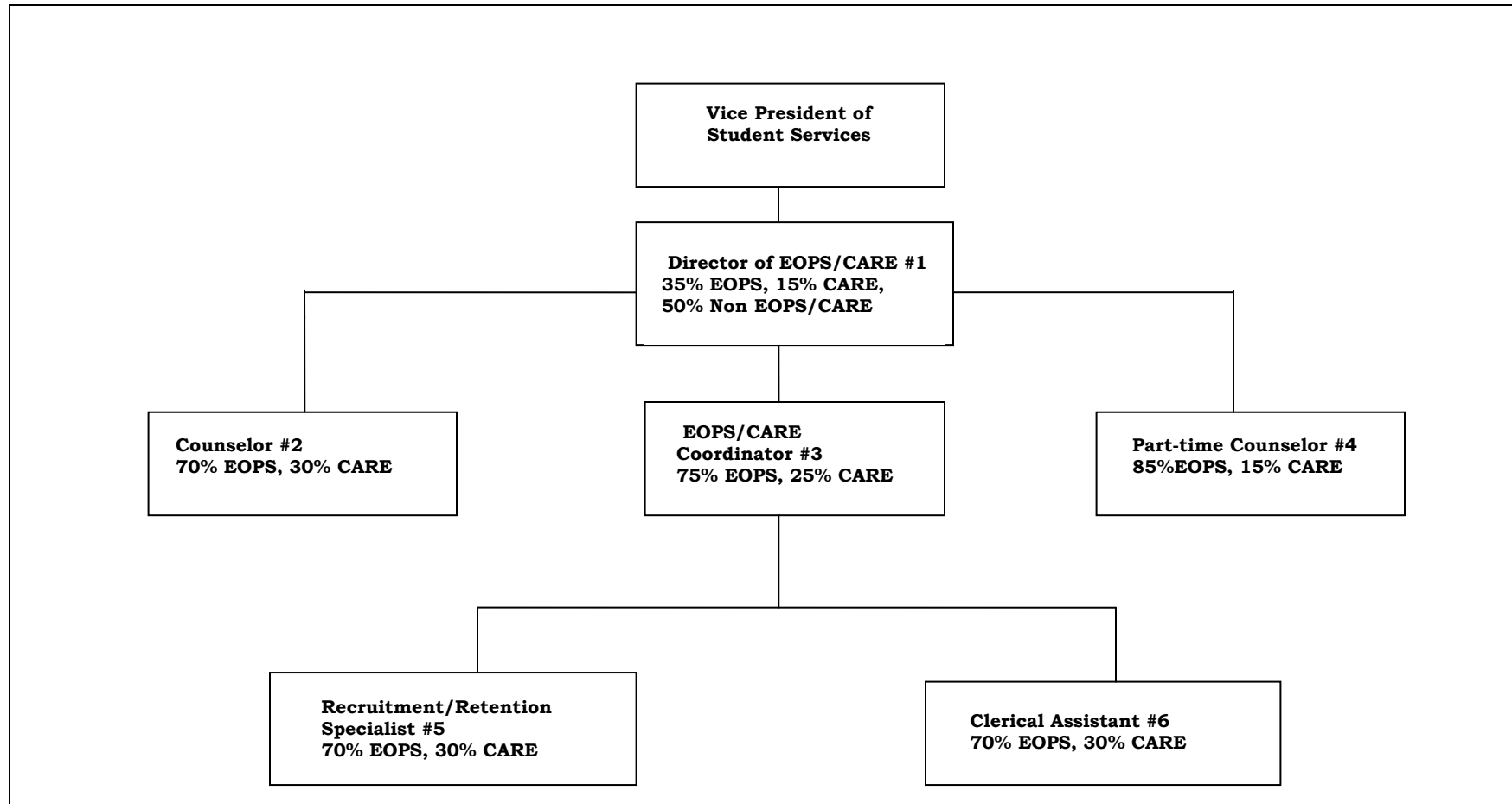

For the academic year 2011-2012 the EOPS program at Cuesta College served 267 students, that's 45 students above the cap. The District's contribution to the program again exceeded the required level.

The EOPS staff continued to serve on many committees and advisory boards, such as; Financial Aid Committee, Student Support and Success, Student Diversity & Equity, Staff Development, Latina Leadership Network, Disabled Students Program & Services, Planning & Budget, and College Council. Staff also participated in many outreach activities focused on local and out of area high school students, along with campus and community outreach events.

The EOPS program offered priority registration to 267 students during the academic year.

The EOPS program continued its lending library services, which served 145 students in addition to the EOPS Book Voucher.

Staff provided retention workshops to EOPS students in jeopardy of not achieving at least a 2.0 GPA, or not meeting the minimum EOPS Mutual Responsibility Contract (MRC) requirements. EOPS students were also encouraged to attend on campus workshops provided by the Academic Support Lab. Workshop topics included; Time management, How to read a textbook, Creative Problem Solving, Expelling Anxiety, Wise Study Habits, Overcoming Procrastination and many more.

The EOPS Program received a \$1500 grant from the college foundation to purchase student planners, 315 planners were purchased and distributed to students during EOPS/CARE orientations.

Three EOPS students participated in the Cuesta College Foundation Student Ambassadors Program. This program gives qualified students the opportunity to participate in various foundation events, public outreach engagements, and leadership activities at Cuesta College. Each student receives scholarship stipends in exchange for their service.

Special Accomplishments

Alpha Gamma Sigma (campus honor society) had 19 EOPS students participating in the Fall 2011 and Spring 2012.

17 current EOPS students graduated with an AA/AS degree, while 24 former EOPS students also received an AA/AS degree.

12 EOPS students received Certificates of Proficiency

39 EOPS students received academic scholarships.

In the Fall of 2011, 73 students received between a 3.0 and 3.9 GPA. There were 17 students that received a 4.0 GPA

In the Spring of 2012, 58 students received between a 3.0-3.9 GPA, and 12 students earned a 4.0 GPA.

There were 9 students that transferred to California State Universities.
